Schedule:

Day 1. Saturday, 24, April 2010. Team competition and Individual (3rd dan & under (including Mu-dan)) Day 2. Sunday, 25, April 2010. Individual competition (4th dan, 5th dan, Shogo (Renshi, Kyoshi))

Competition system: The Competition is judged on accuracy in hitting the target

1) Team Competition: Team of 3 archers of each country in sitting position (zasha)

Preliminary: 12 arrows/each team (4 arrows x 3 archers)

First 8 Teams go to Final

Final: 12 arrows (4 arrows x 3 archers)

Kyosya: 1 arrow x 3 archers in case of same points

2) Individual Competition: 5 archers in sitting position (zasha)

Preliminary: 2 arrows each archer

KAICHU-SHA (the archers scoring 2 hits) go to Final

Hoshi-Mato (white target with black center) of 24cm is used for Final

IZUME- Kyosha (shooting until missing the target) is used to decide the Champion Apart from the champion, ENKIN-Kyosha (distance from the center of the target) is used.

Dress Code: White Kyudogi, white TABI, black HAKAMA

A name tag is given at the reception.

Qualification:

Membership of an affiliated organization of the International Kyudo Federation Participation of non affiliated organization is admitted.

Recognition:


The first three are recognized in Team Competition The first five are recognized in Individual Competition There were 22 some countries in attendance. Places such as Canada, Russia, Argentina, Spain, Taiwan, France, Finland, Sweden, Switzerland, and the USA.

The first three placement in **Team Competition** are:

Gold Medal: France (Michel Dupont, Marc Bertin, Patricia Stalder) (on the right) Silver Medal: UK (Liam O'Brien, Cundy Michael, Ray Dolphin) (on the left) Bronze Medal: Finland (Tohjola Juha-Tekka, Aittomaki Tuomas, Malmi Ritva-Liisa)

In the semifinal the winner team placed a fantastic 12 hitting on 12 shooting that means that all the three archers have paced in the target all the arrows they shooted (in Japanese this is called Kaichu). Congratulation to the winners. Good also the 4th position of Italy (Leonardo Squicciarini, Nami Avento, Santo Elici) and 5th for Germany.

The bronze medal were not assigned because only 2 kyudoka qualified hitting 2/2

Yondan - Godan and upper classification (4th dan & 5th dan): 1. Shannon Cynthia - USA - 4 dan

No 2nd and 3rd place because no one else reached the qualification for the final

Mudan - Sandan classification (3rd dan & under):
